fter reading the 130 online Soapbox entries for ARRL Straight Key Night 2007, I don't know what the most impressive thing about the operating event would be. A total of 1950 contacts were reported in the 237 participant reports received. While those numbers are down from last year, I think that is purely an indication of the demands placed on amateurs at this time of year rather than a lack of interest in our Amateur Radio heritage.

SKN really has become an annual "tip of the cap" to the wonderful history and heritage of our hobby and service. The Soapbox underscores the *passion so many hold for their roots in the hobby*. Time and again the posters speak of their Elmers, first keys, vintage radios and the memories this 24 hour operating event brings to them. Whether making a single QSO to celebrate the event or pounding the brass for hours on end, SKN is a tribute to the nostalgia we all hold dear.

But the participants don't wistfully long for the "Days of Future Passed" (thanks to the Moody Blues for the powerful image that album title evokes). Alongside the Heathkit HW-16s (now fewer than six entries noted using that vintage rig) and Viking Challengers you will find participants just as likely to be using a radio complete with all the gadgets.

The allure of this event more and more becomes the blending of past with present, vintage keys to vintage (or modern) gear. Whether you are brand new to the hobby or have been around since Hiram himself was lighting up the ether, one contact on SKN and I suspect you are transported to a sense of appreciation for Amateur Radio as a hobby and the sense of enjoyment it can have in that capacity.

A total of 43 states as well as several Canadian provinces/territories and several DXCC entities (Panama, Puerto Rico, Finland, Belgium and Iraq) were represented in SKN 2008, with Texas leading the way with 22 stations on the air, followed by California with 19.
